RE: California Planning Roundtable Report – 2019-2020

DATE: November 1, 2020

Formed in 1980, the California Planning Roundtable is (CPR) is an organization of experienced planning professionals who are members of the American Planning Association (APA). CPR is a policy research and development resource for the California Planning profession to enhance the sustainability and livability of California's communities. CPR addresses policy issues with solutions that can be widely applied in the planning practice.

We currently have 29 members with the capacity for 34 positions, including two positions from state or federal government agencies, 4 positions from academia, and the remaining 28 positions evenly divided between public and private sector practicing planners. Per our by-laws, half of the members are from Northern California and half are from Southern California.

For 2019-2020, CPR focused on the following activities:

1. Published and distributed *Planning to House California Beyond 2020* (see attached), including preparation of an introductory video;
2. "Planners Count" - participated in promoting the importance of the Census 2020 count to planners;
3. Held a Planning & Equity Conversation amongst members;
4. Organized a leadership and panel sessions for the APACA chapter conference, focused on career development, equity, and infrastructure for infill;
5. Prepared and are in the process of implementing a communication strategy;
6. Funded a donation to the APACA Foundation;
7. Participated in PHEAL (Planning Health, Equity, Advocacy, and Leadership).



California Planning Roundtable

Since our last report in March 2019, we held our 2019 spring meeting in Merced, focused on downtown revitalization and a UC Merced tour. Our 2019 summer meeting was in San Diego where we toured downtown San Diego, discussed regional growth management and delivery of infill housing, by-right housing regulatory approaches, and design considerations. We organized several panels for the APACA chapter conference in Santa Barbara. Our November 2019 retreat was held in Solvang. During 2019 we started to draft the Planning to House California Beyond 2020 report.

2020 was a disruptive year due to the Covid-19 pandemic and we had to cancel our in-person quarterly meetings scheduled since February 2020. We were able to hold our traditional January meeting in Sacramento. Our spring meeting was cancelled completely. We were scheduled to meet in person for our summer meeting in Koreatown in the City of Los Angeles but had to postpone that program until, hopefully, next year. Instead, we held an Equity Conversation virtual meeting.

We were scheduled to hold our annual retreat at UC Davis in November, but instead will hold a virtual retreat on November 6th and 7th, with a program to discuss the election and implications for planning nationally and in California, and a review of lessons learned amongst members using new tools and procedures for on-line public engagement.

At the retreat, we will establish our agenda for 2021. Upon member approval, we anticipate the following initiatives –

- Development of a Leadership Academy Curriculum focused on diversity;
- Development and initiation of our Oral History Listen & Learn Project, “How Planning Affects People,” interviewing individuals of diverse ethnicities and races regarding how they’ve experienced their communities and exploring what roles planning policies and actions may have played (positively and negatively);
- Prepare a “Funding Infrastructure for Infill” white paper;
- Housing Initiative – Next Phase actions;
- Continued PHEAL participation;
- Programs for the APACA annual conference;
- Others to be determined at the retreat.

We still plan to schedule our quarterly meetings through via video conferencing until it is safe to meet in person again. Until then, we won’t have specific locations identified.

Also, given the disruptions this year, the Board has agreed to stay on one more year until our annual retreat in November 2021.

1:00 pm Program – Equity in Planning

Bill provided Introduction

1. +Black Lives Matter for Planning Conversation

- Tanisha reviewed ground rules with group
- Erik shared personal perspectives, actual vs perceived perspectives
 - Benefitted from privilege
 - Experience with racism, police profiling, strange looks from strangers, tokenized by friends, etc
 - Experience with black and white perspectives, ability to code switch depending on circumstances (ex. act professional vs act street)
 - Experiences with systemic racism as planning consultant, accused of representing developer interests vs community interests
 - Easy not to connect with others, takes effort to listen and understand
- Jeanette shared personal perspectives
 - Family experience with redlining, interest-only mortgage
 - Negative experience with police during Watts riots
 - Activism with racism/injustice began in 1960s, Jesse Jackson/Cesar Chavez protests, Black Student Union at UCSB (600 of 12,000 on campus), learned that she came from a horrible disadvantaged neighborhood
 - 1974 Masters in Planning, moved to Bay Area, unable to secure a civil service job, learned that she wasnt only black planner who struggled to land a job during that era
 - 1999 CA APA Conference, invited to speak, Ward Connely keynote speaker, withdrew in protest
 - Numerous challenges in career about qualifications, challenges securing technical work,
 - Need to acknowledge past inequities, disparities, need to change future practices to be more equitable and just
 - 2005 Membership and Inclusion Plan adopted by he Chapter, many items in plan have not materialized, unless we make progress we will not achieve inclusion and equity we are searching for
- Tanisha
 - Background shapes who I she is
 - Both parents grew up in poverty, she is a first generation college grad
 - Live in neighborhood she grew up in, in Antelope, CA
 - First generation college graduate
 - Began career in 2006, 39 years old, told she is the first Chief Black Deputy Director

- Felt she needed to have credibility, respectability, before she could have a seat at the table and a voice
- Called upon to be vulnerable, patient while people learn, grieve while you lead
- Lead thru affinity, persist thru exit strategy
- Once asked to lead staff discussion in response to George Floyd strategy: but things are better here than other countries.
- Need to teach planners to lead as allies, Planners representing marginalized communities cannot lead alone
- Shannon Sharpe: "It's sad. It's not getting better. And me not talking about it or we not discussing race, it's not going away. A person that has cancer can't go to his doctor, the doctor says, 'You know what, we're not going to talk about it and you'll be better in a couple of weeks.' This is a disease, and you better start talking about it because we see it more and more."
- My Ask: Everyone on the roundtable commit to one thing they can do to help a younger planner lead beyond the exit strategy or conquer their obstacles to persist in this challenging space.

Hillary - Asked question: what should someone in my position, with my privilege do?

Bill - Planners tend to focus on these issues with an analytical approach, but personal stories are more impactful

Bernadette – Based on her experience, others in similar circumstances face same fears and reactions, Peers in Public Health could be good model, addressing HIV, abuse, human rights violations. We know planning has perpetuate inequity, need to work that much harder to overcome

Suzanne – Need to recognize unfairness and injustice of carrying vulnerabilities. Need to be vulnerable, need to ask why and come up with creative solutions

Tanisha – As planners we often jump to solutions and don't spend enough time looking at root causes

Bill – When referring to community, what do you mean?

Jeanette – Place, People: natural tendency is to only be around people we know, Planning can be homogeneous, need cross-cultural sharing experience, need to recognized racism is institutionalized, need to understand root causes

Marc- Found what presenters said and how you said it very powerful, lack of attention to emotional experience is a huge blind spot

Vince – Need to acknowledge uniqueness of black experience, across 400 years, need to listen and reflect as individuals, know we want to act but listening and reflecting are actions, complex issues and many are uncomfortable with them, need to be ok with discomfort, this is a journey and we all have different starting points, need to be actively

anti-racist, focus on internal changes we can make, how we can impact profession and system of planning, we can unknowingly perpetuate racist practices, thank all for generosity and humility

2. Social Equity Facilitated Discussion

Victor

- Privilege of working for organizations where social equity is at the forefront
- Planners have created lots of committees and task forces (APA Diversity, APA Social Equity, etc)
- People have been attending to these issues:
 - Who should be there? (Personnel)
 - What are equity driven policies?
 - What are the practices that planners should undertake?
- Did not hear about humility, urgency during work with committees/task forces

Miguel

- Important to acknowledge work of Jeanette, Victor, David to keep the flame going
- In a moment where fire is raging
- Need to position ourselves to be in a better place at the end of the pandemic

Tanisha

- Raging inferno has been burning for decades, only highlighted recently because of COVID, we need to keep awareness of issue at all times

Miguel

- Who will be impacted by evictions due to COVID?

Erik

- Need to distinguish between space based issues vs systemic issues
- Need to think strategically about 5 roots of systemic inequity
- Recommend focusing on Planning Process
 - Engagement
 -
 - Capacity Building
- Trust = Credibility + Reliability + Openness
Community Orientation
 - Credibility:
 - Reliability: Continue this engagement
 - Openness: Provide venues for openly discussing
 - Community Orientation: Purpose of effort is for benefit of community

Victor

- How do you create environment where practice is encouraged, and mainstream, standard way?
- Need to build up and support practices. How?

Hanson

- What can we do personally?
- We all come in with biases, we have been shaped by systemic racism
- Decisions are made individually but made collectively
- Not going to be able to change individuals who are bigoted

Alex

- Need to celebrate and welcoming to everyone

Laura

- Many conversations with systemic racism
- Could we do something to introduce Planning to younger people?

Kacey

- What is something that each of us will commit to do? Hold ourselves accountable

Hillary

Jeanette

- Requirements can be helpful, hold people accountable

Tanisha

- Too often we are quick to dismiss input from community engagement sessions, didn't give us policy feedback, public doesn't speak planner or policy, we are responsible to decipher

Terry

- Can we record interview with people where planners have perpetuated racism, short videos to educate planners
- Should we have a CM requirement that addresses social equity?

Elaine

- Need to reflect on how we have approached projects
- We can be allies

Vince

- We need to think about actions we will take to listen to voices that are marginalized
- We need to think of new ideas

Bill

- Should we acquiring and telling stories.
 - Tanisha: Need to be aware of limitations, vulnerabilities that may be exposed, need to recognize what we are asking for
- Tell stories about how they have been affected by planning
 - Tanisha: Each of us are governmental employees, fear of govt will limit, what questions and who questions are key

Miguel

- Why do we want to do this project? To change people's minds and hearts. May be enter a period where technocratic era is ending and more becoming more humanistic. Envision how other feel, how they have been effected
- Potential for paradigm shift in planning

Hanson

- Personal stories add up. Trying to educate public and personal stories have more impact. Just data is not effective to everyone

Erik

- The term systemic racism is dominant in media. Most don't understand what it is. Help people understand what it is – short and easy to understand.

Virtual Retreat Meeting

1. Summary of 2020 Meetings

Takeaways were: the Governor is focused on integrating housing, transportation, and climate resilience across state departments. However, there needs to be more collaboration with local governments about implementation to ensure that meaningful outcomes are achieved.

Spring Meeting: A Spring meeting was scheduled to occur in Los Angeles but was cancelled due to the impacts of COVID-19.

Summer Meeting: Our Summer meeting was virtual and focused on the significance of Black Lives Matter for Planning. Takeaways were: the voices and perspectives our black communities have been ignored. A critical first step is to take the time to listen. For example, the black experience cannot be generalized—it is as nuanced as other ethnic/cultural groups in America. Solutions to past and present injustices require credibility, reliability, and openness with a community orientation.

Virtual Meeting Platform: To support our virtual meetings during the pandemic, CPR purchased a zoom account. Committees and planning teams may book zoom meetings using this account. Please contact Laura Stetson or Kacey Lizon for the zoom account information.
